### The word gap

Quite simply, the word gap refers to a lack of language. According to a recent study by Oxford University Press -Why Closing the Word Gap Matters: Oxford Language Report, there is now evidence that a growing number of children do not have a good enough vocabulary to learn effectively.

Why does it matter? 'Without enough language – a word gap – a child is seriously limited in their enjoyment of school and success beyond.' Children with a good vocabulary are four or five times more likely to do well at school and in the workplace, to develop strong relationships, and to have good mental health.

Reading and listening to a variety of books exposes children to new ideas, new places, new people, and, importantly, to new words and phrases. All this improves children's own language and understanding, their communication skills, and, in turn, their chances in life.
